Wow, what a year that only God could have foreseen! Yet, He was present with us at every step. Teen Challenge saw His consistent provision and support over the last 12 months, including during an early-March COVID-19 outbreak at our Ontario Men's Centre, in London, ON.

At every Centre, our staff have been outstanding! They have been flexible and creative, trusting God as they dealt with constant changes in Public Health regulations and evolving Health & Safety procedures; all while still helping men and women succeed in our program.

As CEO, I am proud and was often inspired by the positive attitudes of our clients. They embraced the privilege of being in a safe place, faithfully followed all the new COVID-19 protocols for everyone's protection and focused on their recoveries.

Looking back, God prepared Teen Challenge Canada well for the pandemic. Two new centres launched in 2019 and provided additional space to safely help adults escape addiction even while dealing with provincially mandated capacity reductions. In addition, our work over the last few years to centralize client intake and unify our treatment policies and procedures, prepared us to respond quickly to the crisis.

I remain deeply concerned about "the other pandemic" — increasing addictions and rising overdose deaths across the country. Early statistics reveal COVID-19 is contributing to a sharp increase in drug and alcohol abuse and suspected opioid overdose deaths (see pages 10-11).

Thank you to our faithful sponsors and donors. Without your committed financial support and continued prayers, we simply could not continue to provide our life-changing program throughout this critical time. Your ongoing partnership and support allow us to continue to make our program available to all those seeking addiction help, as we continue to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

Although the past year has been difficult, we maintain a positive outlook for 2021 knowing God is with us and our organization overall is healthy. I would also like to express my gratitude to Jacques Lapointe for his many years of leadership and service, and to Irene Pfeiffer as she assumes leadership of the Board – we are truly blessed to have such capable leaders.

THE FACE OF ADDICTION?

Many of those facing addiction, who come to a Teen Challenge Canada centre are looking for help with personal addictions. They arrive at our doors feeling worthless and exhausted, wanting to end the cycle of substance abuse.

Many suffering in addiction describe 'needing' drugs and alcohol 'just to feel normal' and how drugs and alcohol slowly took over every aspect of their lives. Many of these men and women, describe how they broke promises, told lies, stole from loved ones and degraded themselves just to acquire their substance of choice. But at Teen Challenge we know that these past life choices do not need to dictate the future of those entrenched in addiction.

Slowly, as individuals in our program commit to their journey of recovery, they uncross their arms, unclench their fists, and begin to put down the defences they needed during life in addiction. During counselling sessions, they release hurts and acknowledge the harm they have caused to others. They respond to life-giving words and transforming prayers as they embrace God's truth about themselves. Through community with staff and others in recovery, they learn to care and be cared for again. Serving each other and volunteering in the community, reignites a desire to work and contribute.



With our nation focusing on the COVID-19 pandemic throughout 2020, the alcohol and drug epidemic across Canada continues to worsen. There is no doubt that the pandemic is having a negative impact on those struggling with addiction and those experiencing mental health concerns.

To stay safe, Canadians had to reduce contact with family, friends, and colleagues. This loss of community has led to boredom, stress and an irregular schedule which has led to an increase in substance use and drug overdoses. Support and treatment services have been reduced, closed, or shifted to virtual. With fewer community support programs available, many people began to rely on drugs and alcohol and could not access services to help with their substance abuse. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, Teen Challenge Canada has continued to offer our life-changing treatment program to those seeking help and hope with their addiction. We are committed to keeping our doors open to be part of the long-term solution for Canadians and their families experiencing addictions.



TEEN CHALLENGE CANADA

CORE PROGRAM

PHASE1 (MONTHS 1-4)

Men and women stabilize as they detoxify their minds, bodies and spirits. An accredited Addiction Counsellor helps clients create a treatment plan and work through emotions and personal trauma. During this phase, clients learn to adapt to structure, live and work with others and cope with their pain caused by addiction. Unfortunately, due to the challenging nature of this work, only about half of our clients choose to complete Phase1.

PHASE2 (MONTHS 5-8)

Clients continue to learn about themselves and the Bible. They continue to create healthy routines, hone employment skills, volunteer in the community, and share their recovery stories at churches. During this phase, clients are eligible for involvement in our Sponsorship Program.

PHASE3 (MONTHS 9-12)

During the final four months of our core program, clients create an exit strategy and a relapse prevention plan. They develop leadership skills, mature in their faith and where possible, improve family relationships.

AFTERCARE PROGRAM (POST-GRADUATE)

PHASE4 (MONTHS 12-24)

If a position is available, graduates can choose to stay at a Teen Challenge Centre for an additional 6-months to 1-year and work alongside staff and current core program clients, while continuing in a mentoring relationship with a counsellor and staff members.

PHASE5 (MONTHS 24-36)

If a position is available, after a successful completion of a Phase4 Program, Phase5 graduates are hired in a staff position supporting a local Teen Challenge Canada Centre. They join a local church, attend Celebrate Recovery meetings and begin to give back to society.

BECAUSE CANADIANS PARTNER WITH TEEN CHALLENGE

Teen Challenge Canada is a testament to the compassion and generosity of our donors. Their ongoing support through prayer, volunteer service and donations, enables us to help those who have lost hope in their fight against addiction. Together we are making a difference in the lives of men and women from across Canada, who want a fresh start and freedom from substance abuse!

Individuals in addiction enter a Teen Challenge centre full of fear, anger, and despair. Gradually as they walk their personal 'road to recovery', they begin to trust the staff, others in the program and God. As they release their pain, their hearts are opened, and they begin to see it is possible to live a life free from addiction. They begin to rebuild their bodies with healthy food and exercise, but most importantly, their hearts are filled with faith, joy and purpose, sometimes for the first time in their lives.

Our core program lasts 12-months and focuses on community engagement, spiritual formation, work therapy, addiction counselling and leadership development. Graduates can deepen their recovery during an additional 12-month Phase4 program. Then they can apply to work in a staff position while receiving ongoing support in a Phase5 position for a final 12 months; for a total of up to 36 months of addiction recovery treatment! All graduates receive aftercare mentoring online and by phone through connections with an Aftercare Coordinator and by local in-person support groups, where available.



Past graduates may apply to return for a six-month refresher if they feel they need additional support with maintaining their sobriety. Our program is delivered by locally trained front-line staff who are the hands and feet of Jesus, walking daily with those in our care on the 'road to recovery'.

For those who work, volunteer and support the ministry of Teen Challenge Canada, the return on investment is seeing lives transformed and recovered from addiction, but also seeing graduates return to their families and communities healthy in mind, body and spirit. Individuals who receive treatment return to their communities, able to give back by working, supporting their families, paying taxes, and volunteering, etc. When the cycle of addiction is broken, families and communities are restored.

TEEN CHALLENGE GRADUATE STORY

HOPE FOR A FUTURE

"I can remember one night my dad drove to a building in the middle of nowhere. He told me he'd be right back." As it got darker, Riccardo became more and more afraid. He waited for hours while his dad, John, got high.

John was in and out of his son's chaotic childhood. "It was usually my mom and me living in an apartment. We bounced around a lot." Riccardo's addiction began gradually. "It went from drinking wine at the dinner table with my family, to drinking at my Grade 6 graduation and getting caught." Later, smoking weed on the weekend progressed to a daily habit. Looking for a better high, he tried magic mushrooms, acid, and cocaine with his friends. "That brought me to the lowest point of my addiction."

With nothing left to live for, Riccardo wanted to end it all. That's when a friend suggested Teen Challenge. Desperate for change, by the fall of 2008 Riccardo was willing to do a year-long, faith-based program. "Teen Challenge gave me hope for a future...it gave me my life back."

But the story doesn't end there. After years of Riccardo praying that his father would get help, John entered Teen Challenge in 2013. "I remember judging my father growing up thinking I am never going to be like that guy, to wishing I could be a quarter of the man he has become today," says Riccardo. The Teen Challenge program helped John become the leader of his family the way God intended.

Riccardo says, "Teen Challenge gave us [my father and I] a gift we can never repay. They gave us our lives back. They gave us freedom from addiction. I am so proud and thankful!"



Our compassionate staff are committed to Christ and to demonstrating God's love. They remain sensitive, yet firm, in this difficult calling to work with people in crisis.

OUR STAFF ARE SKILLED

Trusting God for the ultimate outcome, our staff harness the best insights, practices and methods for therapy, counselling, skills training, and personal development.

OUR APPROACH IS INTENSIVE

Clients live communally 24 hours a day and participate in extensive learning and therapeutic activities for an entire year.

OUR PROGRAM IS VOLUNTARY

We do everything we can to help clients complete the program, but give them the freedom to leave.

OUR PROGRAM IS HOLISTIC

We use a variety of program elements to help clients grow healthy spiritually, socially, mentally, and physically.

RECOVERY IS A PROCESS OF SPIRITUAL AND PERSONAL GROWTH

Breaking patterns of addiction is messy, time consuming, and hard. To get free, clients need to unpack and allow God's light to shine on their darkest moments and deepest needs. They must also learn to trust others and form healthy relationships.

Clients do not need to be Christian to enroll in Teen Challenge. However, there is a radical impact when men and women acknowledge God's place in their lives and accept His offer of a clean slate. As hope, grace, and forgiveness take root, they are launched on a lifelong journey of transformation.

TEEN CHALLENGE CLIENTS IN PROGRAM

- 66 clients in program on average per week in 2020
- 39.700 person-hours of classroom instruction on character and other life-changing topics
- 66,200 person-hours of work therapy
- 2,040 total hours of addiction counselling provided
- In 2020, only 20% of applicants entered the program

MENTAL HEALTH AMONG OUR 2020 CLIENTS

- 70% of clients had a clinically diagnosed mental health disorder such as anxiety, depression, schizoaffective, and/or eating disorder (bulimia, anorexia nervosa).
- 49% of those diagnosed had more than one mental health issue.

When Teen Challenge supporters Peter and Liz Banman toured Teen Challenge Canada's largest centre, the Ontario Men's Centre in London, ON, Liz was surprised by the below-grade small kitchen, dark dining room and how these inadequate areas were used to prepare and serve the staff and clients.

"The men and the staff deserved something better," says Liz. Afterward, she mentioned the need to her husband Peter and their son Jim. The family owns Banman Developments in London, ON and knew they could help through their business connections and charitable family foundation.

A few years later, Peter talked with Teen Challenge leaders about developing a food services building as part of a larger planned renovation of the existing 100yr old facility. "To kick things off and get more people involved in the project, we hosted a small fundraising breakfast with friends," says Peter. The Banman Family Foundation's anchor donation made the Food Services Complex project possible. The Banmans also matched donations from other Teen Challenge donors who together helped raise the rest of the necessary funds needed to open the 6,400 ft² food services facility.

Now on ground level, this facility has sunlight pouring into the main dining hall from a bank of windows overlooking rolling hills. The purpose-built facility includes a well-designed kitchen with commercial grade equipment that makes life "exponentially better" for men supporting meal prep, serving, and cleaning as part of their work therapy. The cafeteria is large enough to hold chapel meetings with everyone in the program plus the staff. "This significant investment from the Banman family and Teen Challenge donors, sends a powerful message to the men in the program that they are valued and increases the sense of community," says Centre Director, Chuck Butler.






DISTRIBUTION OF GIVING INCOME.

IN 2020, COVID-19 RESULTED IN MANY NEW GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC HEALTH RESTRICTIONS FOR OUR PROGRAM & FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES.

Faced with the pandemic, Teen Challenge Canada's top priority was that clients in the middle of our 12-month rehabilitation program did not lose the gains they had achieved by leaving our Centres. Each program location has a dedicated staff team of individuals with unique roles and skills. Maintaining a quality program meant keeping these essential staff employed, even when many fundraising activities were curtailed by the restrictions. Fortunately for our clients, tremendous support from our donors, supplemented by the Government of Canada's Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS), allowed us to keep essential services running and our centre teams together. In the end, CEWS contributed \$1.4 million to our centre operations, almost completely offsetting fundraising shortfalls due to suspended church outreaches, in-person events, vehicle donation and thrift store activities.

WENDY COLVIN 8

Since 2006, Bonavista Church in Calgary has supported the Teen Challenge Alberta Men's Centre as one of their local missions. The church has hosted Teen Challenge graduations and church outreach services.

As a way to "live out our faith through actions as well as words" says Wendy Colvin, "a weekly prayer group from Bonavista visits the Men's Centre one Tuesday per month." Prior to COVID-19, the prayer group had been visiting the Men's Centre for over 16 years. When they were able to visit, group members greeted the men with hugs then would sit in a circle to share requests and what they were grateful for. The men received prayer but also had a chance to care for the volunteers. "My husband has advanced Alzheimer's. It is a painful situation. Several men have been incredibly compassionate," says Wendy.

Wendy and the group pray faithfully for the men at the Centre. "Some of these men have had terrible battles to overcome. They struggle, fail and rise again," says Wendy. Bonavista prayer group members also attend graduations and fundraising events. "We have seen men restored to their families. Does it get any better than that?" Wendy adds, "I have been more enriched than they have."

The issue of addiction touches Wendy personally. "My son battled drug and alcohol addiction." She knows the importance of faith-based addiction treatment. "[At Teen Challenge] these men have a whole year to heal, grow, break free, and learn to walk with the Lord." Though she lives on a limited income, Wendy says, "Teen Challenge is an effective investment of my time and money."



ALBERTA MEN'S CENTRE

— A MESSAGE FROM CENTRE DIRECTOR, GREG CORNELSEN —

Even as COVID-19 restrictions were very difficult for the men in our care, many chose to have a positive attitude.



As more Public Health directives were added, I think back to early in the pandemic, when I had to make an announcement about more restrictions, one client stated, "The people most at risk are those moving about freely, not taking precautions. I am happy to be in a safe place!"

For many, our Centre is a physically and emotionally safe place, where men can begin to trust God as they get free from their addictions. Daily, our front-line staff help the men in our care explore God's love and plan for their lives. To make the most of our increased time together, when men could not leave the



centre or have guests, we participated in additional group therapy sessions and enjoyed outdoor adventures. The men got creative with wood projects and spent extra time in the garden—which resulted in more fresh produce. Five men who graduated this year stayed on at the Centre in Phase4 positions for an additional year to deepen their recovery.

When COVID-19 restrictions lift and construction is finished, we are excited to be able to accommodate 24 men in our core program and six graduates in our Phase4 aftercare program!

SASKATCHEWAN MEN'S CENTRE

— A MESSAGE FROM CEO, GLEN SMELTZER —

According to Healthing.ca, the province of Saskatchewan recorded more drug toxicity deaths in the first eight months of 2020 than in all of 2018.



The pandemic made it more difficult to provide addiction treatment and will likely increase addiction problems in the long-term. Clearly our services are more critical than ever.

To help meet this great need in the Prairie region, Teen Challenge Canada now has three centres able to serve up to 75 individuals at a time, helping them find freedom from addiction. The Saskatchewan Men's Centre, which opened in 2005, serves alongside the Prairie Hope Women's Centre in Hague, SK, and the newly expanded Alberta Men's Centre in Priddis, AB.

In 2020, 17 men receiving treatment at the Saskatchewan Men's Centre persevered through the COVID-19 restrictions and graduated this year! Very few left the program early—they felt safer here than in the community. Two graduates stayed on for a Phase4 program at the Centre. Another graduate started Bible College in January. Despite current challenges, these men truly have hope for the future.

The men at the Saskatchewan Men's Centre miss seeing the volunteers who regularly came to the Centre to visit with them, and with church outreach services on hold, some have yet to experience the joy of sharing their recovery stories and receiving encouragement and support from local church groups.

NORTHERN ONTARIO MEN'S CENTRE


— A MESSAGE FROM CEO, GLEN SMELTZER —

Life and health are truly precious gifts. In 2020, this truth was evident to us like never before as COVID-19 hit close to home.



In early March, as the World Health Organization declared a pandemic, there was a COVID-19 outbreak at the Teen Challenge Ontario Men's Centre. We were mandated by Public Health officials to close for two months while staff and clients fulfilled quarantines, sanitized thoroughly and implemented new safety protocols.

Once we were able to reopen the Centre, in keeping with public health guidelines, we reduced our capacity from 64 beds to 32. It is heartbreaking to see empty beds when the need for addiction treatment is so great! Men who enter the program under COVID-19 restrictions are even more courageous than usual.



Upon arrival, they must quarantine for 14 days and understand that no one may leave unless there is a medical emergency; plus, no outside visitors for the foreseeable future.

Yet, God is with us in these circumstances. We see His hand at work as the men pray for and encourage each other in their recovery. Our staff keeps the men in our care engaged with extra time to participate in exercise and fun activities. This year also marked the year our new 'Banman Hall' food services facility was opened. This purpose-built facility allows those in our program and our staff, to all eat and fellowship together safely.





TEEN CHALLENGE GRADUATE STORY

HAD LOST EVERYONE SEVERYTHING I LOVED

Before going to Teen Challenge, Laura abused alcohol. "I was hungover all day at work with the shakes, until I could get to the LCBO and get my bottle." She hid her vodka in water bottles and drank all evening until she passed out.

After several years, her husband realized how serious her addiction was and left her. "I decided to kill myself when my husband left me. I had lost everyone and everything I loved." A friend texted Laura that day, inviting her to attend the Christmas pageant at her church. "I don't remember much of the play... I bawled, and the peace of Jesus filled my heart. I decided to live my life differently."

Laura's friend helped her apply to Teen Challenge. "The [Teen Challenge] program helped me in every aspect of my daily life," says Laura.

She learned routines and habits that helped reset her life. "My mind was a mess. I didn't know you could choose what you think about. I discovered that I don't have to be depressed and anxious." After graduating from Teen Challenge in 2013, Laura reunited with her husband and now they have two children.

Today, Laura is doing well, though she admits it is hard work to stay sober. Laura's pastor mentors her as she continues to embrace God's love and make positive choices. "God is bringing all the right people into my life and directing my path. I feel like I'm doing what I was made to do."
